After several days of violence in Guadeloupe, now is time for dialogue. Prime Minister Jean Castex meets at 6 p.m. in Matignon the Minister of Health Olivier Véran and several Guadeloupe elected officials to discuss the scenes of riots that shook the West Indian Island. Shops were broken in to, roads were blocked, and cars were set on fire to denounce the health measures with regard to the coronavirus. The situation seems to have calmed down after the arrival of law enforcement sent from metropolitan France.

Regarding vaccinations: the Scientific Council recommends lowering to 50 the age for a 3rd dose. The council goes even further and communicates this evening that this booster shot should concern the entire adult population due to the evolution of the epidemic. Currently in France only those over 65 and people at risk can receive a 3rd dose.

Meanwhile in Germany, Angela Merkel believes that the current restrictions are no longer sufficient. Measures may be strengthened as the country implements new restrictions against the unvaccinated.

Cédric Jubillar remains in prison. His new request for release was rejected today by the Toulouse Court of Appeal. Imprisoned since mid-June and indicted for intentional homicide, Delphine's husband still claims his innocence in relation to the disappearance of his wife. It was almost a year ago in Cagnac les mines in the Tarn. The body of the nurse has still not been found despite numerous searches.

And then in soccer, after the league's disciplinary committee met urgently today, the day after the incident which led to the end of the match between OL and Marseille, games will be played behind closed doors at the Groupama Stadium in Lyon as a precaution. The player of Marseille will also file a complaint, as communicated by his club. In this case, the final sanctions of the league will be decided by December 8th.
