A return to a more or less normal life for vaccinated people today, which marks the first step in the gradual lifting of health restrictions. No more restrictions in theaters or stadiums, and no more obligation to wear the outdoor mask. Teleworking 3 days a week is also no longer mandatory, even if it remains recommended.

And to fight against the coronavirus epidemic, Pfizer requests authorization for its vaccine for children under 5 in the United States. That is to say for 6 months and over. In the event of authorization by the FDA, it would be a first for this age group.

In the rest of the news, Emmanuel Macron is expected today in the Hauts-de-France. The Head of State will first go to Liévin, in Pas-de-Calais, to commemorate the memory of the 42 miners who died on December 27th 1974 at the Saint-Amé pit. The Head of State will end his visit to Tourcoing, in the North, to defend the European migration pact and the reform of the Schengen area.

The relatives of the former dog trainer Nordahl Lelandais, who is on trial for the murder of little Maëlys, testified yesterday at the assizes court of Grenoble. His ex-girlfriend and friends were heard during this 2nd day of the trial, and portrayed the personality of the suspect. Sven Lelandais, Nordahl's brother, described his younger brother as someone who is not violent, which went against all the other testimonies. Accused of the murder of little Maëlys, Nordahl Lelandais risks life imprisonment.

Nearly 3 million poultry have been slaughtered in France since the appearance of cases of avian flu at the end of November. The announcement was made yesterday from the Ministry of Agriculture. According to their census, the country has 328 outbreaks in farms, including 218 in Le Landes, a department where massive slaughters were organized.
