The United States again bereaved by a shooting. Nearly 10 days after the massacre in a Texas school, a man opened fire last night on the campus of a hospital in Tulsa, Oklahoma. The shooter, whose motives we do not know, then committed suicide, according to a local television channel.

Also abroad, the beginning of 4 days of festivities in the United Kingdom. The British will celebrate the 70 years of reign of Elizabeth II. This platinum jubilee will give rise to many celebrations. About 50 schools in the city will be affected by this experiment, in which school directors will be able to choose their teaching team.

Despite the war, Ukrainian footballers do not lose hope of participating in the World Cup in Qatar. They qualified for the final of the play-offs last night by beating Scotland 3/1. A final, which will see the Ukrainian team in Wales, is scheduled for Sunday.

And finally, Johnny Depp wins his defamation lawsuit against Amber Heard. The actress is ordered to pay him \$15 million in damages for accusing him of domestic violence. Depp was also sentenced in return to pay \$2 million to Heard.
