The objective of Emmanuel Macron is to Accelerate the reindustrialization of France. The Head of State is currently unveiling from the Elysee a whole series of measures. He must reveal the main axes of the "green industry" bill, which will be presented next Tuesday in the Council of Ministers. This theme will also be at the heart of Emmanuel Macron's trip to Dunkirk tomorrow. There, he will announce the construction of a new manufacturing plant for electric car batteries.

Enough is enough. The mayor of Saint-Brevin-les-Pins in Loire-Atlantique resigns. His town was the target of far-right movements since the announcement of a project to install a reception center for asylum seekers. The home of the elected official had even been set on fire in March. An investigation is underway. Since this announcement, there have been many political reactions. Emmanuel Macron, Elisabeth Borne, Marine Le Pen and Fabien Roussel all gave their support to the ex-mayor.

And a terrible accident occurred in Luçon in Vendée, where a 16-year-old teenager is in critical condition after falling from the roof of a disused swimming pool. It happened during the night from Monday to Tuesday. The young man fell 6 meters lower. He was put in an artificial coma and transferred to the Nantes University Hospital.

In Spain, 2 billion euros are allocated to fight the drought that the country has been experiencing for weeks. Faced with this catastrophic situation, authorities will massively invest in infrastructures in order to reuse wastewater. A large part of the aid will also be devoted to agriculture, mainly in the livestock and dairy sectors.

And then the Eurovision continues with the 2nd semi-final tonight in Liverpool. 16 countries are in the running. France, represented by the singer La Zarra, is automatically qualified for the grand final of the European competition scheduled for Saturday.
