Our hearts are no longer in the fête de la musique. These were the words of Emmanuel Macron yesterday at the Elysée after the collapse of a building in Paris' rue Saint-Jacques. The facade of the building collapsed in the afternoon. 37 people are injured, 4 of whom are in a life-threatening condition. Two people are still missing under the rubble. The cause of the collapse is still not known.

More than a thousand demonstrators are expected in Nantes and hundreds in Toulouse, Lille, Montpellier and Paris today to oppose the dissolution of Earth Uprisings. The environmental collective has been accused of violence by the government. Lawyers for Uprisings de la Terre have announced that they will lodge an appeal before the conseil d'état.

As the oxygen supplies may be dwindling, the search nonetheless continues to try and find the Titan. The tourist submarine has been missing since Sunday with 5 people on board, including a French man. The US Coast Guard has estimated that the Titan's oxygen supply will run out by around 1:08 p.m. today. Regular noises underwater had been detected by Canadian planes, suggesting banging, but the source of the noise has not yet been confirmed.

World leaders, heads of state and activists will be gathering in Paris over the next couple of days at Emmanuel Macron's behest for a summit on how to reinvent the global financial system. The aim is to be able to take tangible measures by the end of the summit, in particular concerning better ways to finance the climate transition in developing countries.

And finally to football and AC Ajaccio has been sanctioned by the disciplinary committee after the attack on 8 year old Kenzo. Kenzo, who is a Marseille supporter, and who suffers from brain cancer, was violently attacked by Corsican supporters on June 3rd during the match between Ajaccio and Olympique Marseille. Ajaccio will now play its first game of the next season behind closed doors.
