Buses and trams will be stopped from 9 p.m. throughout France. This is what Gérald Darmanin asks the prefects. These instructions from the Minister of the Interior come following three nights of riots after the death of Nahel, killed by a policeman. Gérald Darmanin also asked the prefects to systematically issue orders prohibiting the sale and transport of firework mortars and gasoline cans.

As for Emmanuel Macron, he chaired an inter-ministerial crisis unit early this afternoon. He denounces an instrumentalization of the death of the teenager to spread chaos and calls out parents who don't take responsibility, as rioters are often young.

Additional means will be put in place to maintain order. Last night 875 people were arrested, and 249 police officers and gendarmes were injured.

We saw scenes of urban violence this afternoon in Strasbourg. Hundreds of young people gathered in front of the Place des Halles shopping center. The Apple store was robbed, leading many businesses to close down. All customers were evacuated.

Also in the news, Christophe Galtier is still being heard by the police. The future ex-trainer of the PSG is auditioned concerning accusations of racism. Discriminatory remarks were supposedly made during his visit to Nice two years ago. Christophe Galtier has always firmly denied these accusations. His son, John Valovic-Galtier, also heard by the police, was released from police custody early this afternoon.

And France experienced its second hottest month of June since 1900, behind 2003, according to Météo France. The heat was particularly marked over a large northern half of the country. The month was also remarkable for its stormy activity, measured in lightning strikes.
