Their municipalities were hard hit by several nights of riots. 241 mayors are currently being received at the Elysée by Emmanuel Macron. There is no expected announcement or speech from the head of the State at the end of this long meeting, but a listening time necessary to understand what the elected officials have experienced and provide them with the support of the State, indicates the Elysée.

The situation has calmed down last night. 72 people were arrested in France, while there were more than 1,000 arrested Friday evening. In any case, the riots will be expensive, even very expensive. 1 billion euros of damage are estimated for companies according to the head of the MEDEF Geoffroy Roux de Bézieux.

In this context, the government is reaching out to business owners - those who have seen their shops looted or burned. The Minister of the Economy Bruno Lemaire announced this morning cancellations of social and tax charges for those the most affected. Crisis exit advisers will be activated in each department.

In the rest of the news, an inmate is still on the run near Angers. The 42-year-old man who was previously imprisoned in the prison of Orne managed to escape during an exit permit at the end of June. Considered dangerous, he is suspected of two murders and an attempted murder since he has been on the run. A call for witnesses has been launched by the prosecution. About fifty gendarmes and police are mobilized to find him.

And to finish: Every year it's the same anxiety: 700,000 high school students discovered this morning the results of the baccalaureate. The examination pass rate this year is 84.9% according to the Minister of Education Pap Ndyaye – A slight decline compared to last year. For candidates who will have to take catch-up examinations, those will take place from tomorrow until Friday.
