"Our absolute priority is the return of republican order", said Elisabeth Borne before the Senate. The Prime Minister wants to rely on four pillars: The mobilization of the police, the firmness of the penal response, the accountability of social networks, as well as a necessary reminder of parental responsibility and authority.

While on the ground tensions seem to be subsiding, the circulation of buses and trams will resume as usual everywhere in France from this evening. This is what the Minister Delegate for Transport, Clément Beaune, announces. Only 16 people were arrested last night, which is the lowest number of arrests in a week.

After the death of Nahel, citizens' marches are organized on Saturday throughout the country, at the call of 90 left-wing organizations and parties, including La France Insoumise, Les Verts and Solidaires. Their objective is to express "remembrance and anger" and to denounce the policies deemed "discriminatory" against working-class neighborhoods. In a press release, these organizations ask that the "government take its responsibilities and provide immediate responses to end the confrontation".

An investigation has been opened by the Marseille public prosecutor's office after the death of a man last weekend on the sidelines of the riots. He was allegedly targeted by a police flashball, which then caused a cardiac arrest. According to the public prosecutor's office, at this stage, it is impossible to determine whether the victim had participated in the violence.

And the strike is massively renewed at the Journal du Dimanche. The journalists refused to meet today the new editorial director, Geoffroy Lejeune, close to the far right. The journalists are still asking the group's management to cancel the nomination of Geoffroy Lejeune and offer the editorial staff guarantees of legal and editorial independence.
