The police officer who fatally shot Nahel remains in pre-trial detention. The decision was made by the Versailles Court of Appeal. He attended the hearing from his cell in the *prison de la santé*. He is, since last week, indicted for intentional homicide. According to his lawyer, he sees this situation as a nightmare, but will continue to fight.

In the streets, a return to calm is confirmed. Last night was relatively calm with around twenty arrests and one member of the police force injured. Minister of the Interior Gérald Darmanin specifies that since the end of June a ton and a half of firework mortars have been seized in the Paris region.

Also in the news: The European Food Safety Authority has ruled that glyphosate does not raise critical concerns that should prevent its authorization in the EU, as the controversial weedkiller has been accused by several users of causing cancer and is classified as a "probable carcinogen" by the International Agency for Research on Cancer.

And to finish: June was the hottest month ever recorded in the world. This was announced by the European Copernicus observatory. The combined effect of climate change and the return of the El Niño phenomenon are pushing temperatures in the oceans and on land at unprecedented levels. Temperature records have been reported since April on the planet, from China to Spain via the Atlantic Ocean.
