The government has made it its priority: A plan to fight school bullying will be presented this afternoon by Prime Minister Elisabeth Borne. This announcement comes after the beginning of an audit on all rectorates, which follows the discovery of letters and other methods of intimidation against the parents of students who have reported cases of bullying. This was particularly the case for the Versailles rectorate with regard to Nicolas's parents. Nicolas is the 15-year-old teenager who committed suicide at the beginning of September in Poissy. And his case far from being isolated according to Hugo Martinez, founder of the HUGO association which fights bullying at school.

Part of the measures presented today will be devoted to cyberharassment, including strengthening controls on access to social networks or the confiscation of cell phones.

Also in the news: Still no trace of Lina in the Bas-Rhin. The teenager has been missing since Saturday near Saint-Blaise-la-Roche. She was supposed to take a train to Strasbourg but never got on board. Searches resume today, in particular the probing of several bodies of water in the sector.

And in Niger, the French ambassador left Niamey this morning. The military regime in power for two months demanded his expulsion. His immunity and diplomatic visa had notably been revoked.

And then the Rugby World Cup, with a match today: Uruguay - Namibia at 5:45 p.m. in Lyon with a Frenchman on the field: the referee Mathieu Raynal.
