"Everything will go very well" assures Agnès Pannier Runacher. According to the Minister of Energy Transition, France produces enough electricity and gas to get through the cold wave which is currently affecting France. Temperatures are expected to reach -10 to -15 degrees tomorrow in the Eastern half of the country. The day may be the coldest nationally in the last 6 years.

And at the same time, several prefectures have triggered their plan "Grand Froid", including Haut and Bas Rhin as well as Aube. This is also the case in Paris, where more than 270 additional accommodations will be open to families in need.

The Pas de Calais and the North, too, will suffer the severe cold wave head-on. The two departments have already been affected by flooding these past days and Météo France has extended the orange flood alert. Two rivers are still especially monitored: the Canche and the Lys Aval.

Also in the news: The rumors of a reshuffle continue to spread. Last evening Elisabeth Borne was received at the Elysée by Emmanuel Macron. The meeting lasted around 1 hour and fifteen minutes and revolved around the wave of cold weather expected in the country this week and the bad weather in Pas de Calais, according to BFM TV. In the event of a change at Matignon, two names seem to stick out, those of Julien Denormandie and Sébastien Lecornu.

Abroad, the death toll rises to 161 deaths and 323 people missing after the earthquake in Japan last week. The announcement was made by local authorities this morning. The 7.5 magnitude earthquake caused more than a thousand landslides.
